

This past summer it was an honour and a privilege to return to the Regiment after several years away in Ottawa. While outside the unit focussing on the future force and managing the Canadian Army's equipment and resources, I was extremely proud to see and hear of all the things that our Strathcona's were doing across Canada and the World. It was evident that in times of crisis and uncertainty, Strathcona's were there to contribute to whatever was required.

Continuously supporting domestic emergencies as part of Op LENTUS, international deployments abroad as part of Op IMPACT in Iraq, Basic Soldier Training to Ukrainians in the UK and Tank Training to Ukrainians in Poland as part of Op UNIFIER... all while continuously setting the conditions for the deployment of a Tank Sqn (-) to Op REASSURANCE in Latvia; it was evident that the Regiment was carrying a heavy load.

With everything happening in the world and across the CAF, it is comforting to know that many things here in Edmonton remain the same. The Regiment remains capable and poised to perform whatever the Army requires, and the collective strength of the unit is founded on the professionalism and remarkable skill sets of the personnel within it. The team remains operationally focussed in preparing vehicles for exercises and deployments while mutually supporting each other to achieve the collective goals.

Amongst all the operational tasks, as directed by the Canadian Army, the Armoured Corps has embarked on what will be a historic change across the country. This comes in the form of Tank Centralization which will see all Leopard MBTs positioned in Edmonton within our Regiment Lines. With this initiative coming into in effect this past summer, D Squadron (Recce) was converted to C Sqn (Tanks) and conducted a massive PCF cycle to qualify personnel across the whole Sqn. We saw the arrival of Leopard equipment and resources from Gagetown, the reinvigoration of C/S 60, but sadly the divestment of the Coyotes.

This past November also marked another significant period in our Regimental and Armoured Corps history with the deployment of a Tank Sqn (-) to Latvia by B Sqn. Canadian Army has deployed Tanks to a theatre of operations a handful of times and this task marks the initiation of the Canadian Army's robust commitment

to NATO as part of Op REASSURANCE. Operationally focussed the Strathcona's, as Canada's Tank Regiment will see continuous deployments to Latvia every six months similar to our times in Afghanistan. Our Soldiers, Sr NCOs, and Officers alike are proud and enthusiastic about the challenges on the horizon.

I would also like to take the opportunity to give a shout out to the editing team of this year's Strathconian. Having been the OPI in the past, I truly appreciate all of the thankless hours that go into the review and compilation of the Strathconian. My personal thanks to the Editor-in-Chief Maj Blake Tapp, Editor Capt Ali Mansour and the tremendous creativity of Mrs. Kathy Batty. The tradition of the Strathconian is something that sets us apart from other units, and we are very excited to release this edition!

LdSH(RC) was called upon to provide a surge of Sqn minus tanks for Op REASSURANCE in Latvia. Members of the Regiment were also deployed in order to support local emergency services at the wildfires in Fox Creek. RHQ worked effectively from the planning and organization of these deployments to ensuring all members' administrative needs were valid and complete. RHQ worked at full efficiency to ensure each member had what they needed before deploying, and ensured all documents were in good order upon redeployment.



There are a couple reasons why 2023 was not a normal year for B Squadron (Sqn): firstly, it's the first complete year at work since the beginning of COVID and, secondly, by the end of the year, the Sqn deployed to Latvia to become the first sub-unit to deploy tanks overseas since the end of the War in Afghanistan over a decade ago. It is a big honour for us to represent the Canadian Armed Forces, the Armoured Corps and the Regiment. But, in order to make it to Europe, we would need to work up to it, and work we did!

It all started with Exercise (Ex) STEELE LANCE in February, which for those who don't know, is an extremely cold month in Wainwright, Alberta. For many Troopers like Justin "J11" Januszewski, Dakota "Bubbles" Ellis-Hopewell and Xavier "Undercover Franco" Leblanc, it was a harsh introduction to field time with the Strathcona's. Though not what we would call an "Ideal Learning Environment", if one even exists, for the troops to gain some experience and qualifications, but nonetheless, the soldiers persevered and completed the Ex with their fingers and toes mostly intact. With one Ex over, those who thought they were getting a break from field time were horribly wrong as Ex REFLEXE RAPIDE (Level 5 live) was about to start.

From March into April, we found ourselves back in Wainwright where the Sqn had the privilege of working with 5 Brigade during their BUILD. It would be an understatement to say that working in French over the radio was always easy, but despite linguistic challenges, the Sqn blasted through hundreds of tank rounds providing the perfect opportunity for Gunners like **Cpl Cole** "*Knutty*" **Knutson** to show their skills. Yet, still not done with the field, the Sqn moved on to the "Last" iteration of Ex MAPLE RESOLVE in May.

In June, the Sqn headed out for their much-delayed Level 3 Live... yes, we did the Level 5 live first, which gave the opportunity to Troop Leaders like **Capt Ziad** "afraid of the Nutty Putty" **Hmaidan** to "roll heavy" one last time. This would also be our final moments with our tired, old, and much abused Leopard 2A4s before handing them over to C Sqn in "near pristine condition". Weeks later, in early July, B Sqn was finally was able to trade

in Wainwright for Calgary for the Stampede Parade and Spruce Meadows activities.

After a well-deserved summer leave period, the Sqn returned to "THE NEWS". It was not a rumour anymore; B Sqn would deploy with tanks to Latvia. As we shifted our entire focus to getting ready for it, which included briefings, small-arms ranges, departure administration, more briefings, combat FORCE tests, online courses, more briefings (there

In the final weeks before our embarkation leave, a highly anticipated Sqn gunnery competition, put together by WO Matthew "Hands off my Shred box!!!" Collier, was at the top of everyone's mind. The competition was created to elect the best crew who would subsequently be given the honour of being the first crew to fire a Canadian tank in Europe. It consisted of 4 distinct challenges: a gunnery exam, a PT challenge, a crew skills challenge, and finally a few grueling (simulated) rounds in the Leopard Gunnery Simulation Trainer. Despite the hard work by all, including a crew completely comprised of our ambitious maintainers, callsign 22B was announced as the overall winner: Cpl Rendall Forster (Driver), Cpl Nitesh "Always nice!" Semwal (Gunner), Cpl Matthew "Subawooooo" Kuypers (Loader) and Sgt Matthew "Crewmandius" Pekarskie (Crew Commander).

The funny thing about our work-up to this deployment is that if the plans didn't change a thousand times, they didn't change at all! For example, the movement of tanks

and other support vehicles were delayed many times due to multiple factors including delays that "were not political" and being held at the Ontario-Quebec border for "a reason". Of note there was great concern as the strike for dock workers along the St. Lawrence seaway aligned perfecting while our tanks we being loaded. Fortunately, this had little impact as our local spy, **MCpl Emma** "Always in Montreal!" **Crackle-Skulason** and her team assured us that all would be okay. Finally, our departure date was delayed from September to early-October, then mid-October, then end-October, and finally, two-days after our flight was cancelled, we made it out on the 1st of November.

I know that everyone in this Sqn thought at some point that this deployment would be cancelled, but as I am writing these lines from my office on the Adazi Military Base in Latvia, our beloved tanks are here with B Sqn crews preparing them to Deter or Fight, if necessary. Perseverance!

On 29 June 2023, C Squadron was once again stood up to revive its long-standing history as a tank squadron. 

The techs worked day and night to ensure serviceability of the Leopard 2 MBT fleet as well as the remainder of the Sqn's support vehicles. Our ARV Crew also


Some troops rides horses, others ride choppers!

Op LENTUS IRU Fox Creek Fires

Alberta has been hit particularly hard in 2023 with one of the worst fire seasons on record, causing thousands of civilians to be displaced from their homes, seeking shelter from a firestorm ranging across the province. On 29 May 23, D Sqn LdSH(RC), along with members of A sqn, answered the provincial request for aid. A Company of soldiers was dispatched to the Fox Creek Fires to relieve in place 1 CER and link up with incoming Australian Fire fighters. The early days on the fire saw most platoons recovering equipment such as hoses, water pumps and pump kits. The recovery of such equipment would prove invaluable in the coming weeks as the temperature in the region continued to climb. With the Company's feet firmly established on the ground, platoon leaders created ties with fire fighting units from Australia, BC, and Alberta. These units helped train the soldiers on calling in water drops from helicopters in the area, to setting hose guards, to calling in heavy equipment when times were dire.

Capt Dayne Johnson and 1 platoon were quick to answer the call hall back in Australia. when helicopter rides were offered, taking the best opportunities for photo ops while dealing with hot spots on the flanks of the fire. Ground in most areas ranged from swamp to muskeg, to combinations of both, making it extremely difficult at times for crews to traverse the terrain in search of hot spots. Attention from the firefighting leadership changed from fire 23, a mostly contained fire, to fire 27 as fire activity on the lines intensified. Members of 2 platoon under 2Lt Tom Lauterbacher conducted recees into the southwest corner of the fire, finding active flames not previously known, as well as access routes for fire crews to enter and work on the fire. This region became one of the most active portions of the fire seeing several air assets and heavy equipment moved in to deal with the fire, which had jumped a river to continue its move southwest. As the IRU neared the end of its second week, platoons were encompassed in main fire fighting tasks as the number of boots on the ground totaled almost 40% of the fighting force. Soldiers worked tirelessly to aid firefighters in their attempt to contain the fire, prevent flare ups from jumping fire guards and the fire continuing to grow out of control.

Lt Mark Snetzko and members of 3 platoon were dispatched to deal with a region of fire guard where the fire had jumped. Their efforts in the area prevented the fire from continuing a push towards key infrastructure in the area, and inevitably, the town of Fox Creek itself. The efforts of the soldiers on the ground gave firefighters in the area much needed assistance in continuing to contain the fire, making the area safe for civilian work and pattern of life to continue. With days closing in on a return to Edmonton, Soldiers were joined by members of the Australian Arduous Crew for a dinner and photo prior to repatriation home. Soldiers of LdSH(RC) played a crucial role in containing the fires in the Fox Creek area and their efforts were met with appreciation from several members of the local community. As the Company pulled out of the region, rain moved into further aid in keeping the fires at bay. After a much needed time off the soldiers of LdSH(RC) stand ready to once again assist the province if or when they are called.

Operation IMPACT, Canada's mentoring, training, and capacitybuilding mission in the Middle East, includes elements in Kuwait, Iraq, Qatar, Bahrain, Jordan, and Lebanon. In November 2022, the Regiment handed over responsibility as the Lead Mounting Unit for Operation IMPACT to 1 Combat Engineer Regiment. Despite this, the Regiment continued to be well represented in the Middle East throughout 2023. Operation IMPACT Roto 8, which spanned from November 2022 to May 2023, featured members of the Regiment in Kuwait, Iraq, Jordan, and Lebanon, while Rotos 9 and 10, which span from May to November 2023 and November 2023 to May 2024 respectively, includes Strathconas in Iraq and Lebanon.

Members of the Regiment were employed in all manner of roles in the Middle East this year, ranging from Capt Kai Keewatin's jet-setting lifestyle as the Executive Assistant to the Task Force Commander, to Captain Leon Van Heerden and Corporal Colby Smith, who supported coalition air lift in the region by working with the 443d Air Expeditionary Squadron (US). During Roto 8, Majors Blake Tapp and Steve Couture represented Canada as planners embedded in


Operation INHERENT RESOLVE, supporting the ongoing fight against Daesh. For Rotos 9 and 10, Col Errol MacEachern served as the Director of Strategic Communications for that mission.

Canada maintains capacity building teams in both Jordan and Lebanon, focussing on mentoring, developing, and professionally developing the host nation militaries. The Regiment was well-represented in each of these

teams this year. On Roto 8, MWO Michael Gratto served directly with the Canadian Training and Assistance Team (CTAT) – Jordan capacity building section, focussing largely on mentoring students at the Jordanian NCO Academy, supporting the Female Engagement Team in their goal to provide basic skills to female Jordanian soldiers, and developing the capabilities of the Jordanian Quick Reaction Force Battalions. In Lebanon, Capt Carsten MacLean acted as the Roto 8 Deputy Commanding Officer/Operations Officer and MWO Ben Holmes as the Roto 9 and 10 Sergeant-Major. Both were focused on supporting the CTAT – Lebanon Mentoring and Training Teams – which provided surge capability to deliver training on winter conditions, mountainous terrain, sustainment, civil-military

Op UNIFIER

Entering 2023, the Strathcona commitment to Op UNIFIER consisted of **Capt Ekam** "3VP OC" **Uppal**, one FIN Clerk, and a troop of demo staff augmenting the basic training of Ukrainian soldiers Canada led in the United Kingdom. That commitment changed on 26 January, when Canada announced it would be donating four Leopard 2 A4 main battle tanks to Ukraine, which would be followed by four more in February. In order for the Ukrainians to use the tanks effectively, someone was going to have to teach them; that task fell to LdSH(RC) forming the first Leopard Training Element (LTE).

Between 4-12 February, over twenty Strathconas made their way to Poland, settling into the "scenic" town of Świętoszów, in which the Leopard Training Center of Polish Armed Forces is located. Alongside the Norwegian training contingent, the three partner nations set to work simultaneously planning and executing a 30-day Leopard 2 zero-to-

hero course. Led into battle by **Capt Brittney** "*Tank Stuff*" **Shki-Giizis** and **WO Colin** "*Chicken Whisperer*" **Davidson**, the LTE took the lead in developing the plan for entire training mission.

With the overall motto of "iz fine", the LTE directly trained over 14 crews on the Leopard 2 platform between two serials, provided instruction to all Ukrainian crews in specialized areas, translated aid-memoires, and much more. Key contributions were provided by WO Jesse "These Guys are Studs" Bolzan, Sgt Jeff "Iz NOT Fine" Stevenson, and MCpl Sean "I Flew with Protein Powder" Armstrong. Working ten hours a day, six days a week, R&R was taken on the margins and included trips to Prague and Berlin.

Other than a few personnel, the LTE rotated all instructors by 24 April. With the Ukrainians sensing the LTE was now under the leadership of **Capt Philip** "*Prague Driver*" **German**, no new crews were sent to be trained. Necessitating a quick pivot, **Lt Liam** "*Three Knife Minimum*" **Misner**, **Sgt Dave Young**, and **Sgt Mark** "*The Standard is the Standard*" **Weir** instructed a RQ MCpl course overseas using Polish tanks.

Of course, the mission would have been impossible without the supporters attached to the training team. CAF and civilian linguists, members of RCACS, Op UNIFIER HQ in Warsaw, and all other support personnel were critical to mission success.


Op REASSURANCE A Tour of Firsts

After what felt like an eternity of being "flexible", B Squadron finally made it to Latvia. Initially sans Tanks, the squadron arrived with a new name, "BOER", as well as reasonable lodgings in the section of Adazi Military Base (AMB) where they keep the "riff raff".

The first week was relatively easy and included the zeroing of personal weapons under unsullied Range Safety Officer Lt Nik "poppintrackis" Dragatakis, multiple "recces" to Mario's Pizza, and saw final preparations of our "stables". All the while, under MWO James "just an observation" Hamilton and, some would day, despite Sgt Steve "forget everything the Sergeant-Major just said" Gross making public yet oblivious attempts at subversion.

In the early morning of 10 November 2023, the Dutch cargo ship "Oranjeborg" commanded by **Captain Jan-Willem DE VRIES**, docked at the Baltic Container Terminal (BCT) in Riga, Latvia. At that moment,



BOER Squadron finally had vehicles and blossomed back into "Tankers". We were no longer just an "admin burden" to the current Roto... we were now an admin burden with a huge logistical "pull"! To facilitate the contracted transportation of our 54 vehicles and 69 sea cans of kit, we split into two teams with elements of First and Admin Troops conducting the offload from the ship and subsequent loading onto trucks at BCT, while elements of Second and the other half of Admin Troop offloaded the trucks on arrival at AMB. With the BCT alive with reflective vests and hard hats, many of which were external "support", the first monstrously, whoops... up-armoured ARV (CFR 72326), driven by Cpl Chase "ARVin' is easy" Brown, rolled off the ship marking the beginning of a long day. Minutes later, WO Kevin "what's a sock dog" Crowe called for a Tank Driver, but before any of the Drivers could react, a Gunner, Cpl Raymond "if yer not first yer last" Gedge dashed to the front to mount and drive the first Canadian Leopard (CFR 72296) to set track on Latvian soil. As the remainder of the tanks and support vehicles rolled off the ship, some were already loaded on tractor trailers and slowly began making their way through Riga's rush hour traffic to AMB. Patiently waiting for their arrival was a cargo van full of smuggled troops under the watchful eye of WO Matthew "Matty" Collier with Cpl Ryan "Matty in training" Macdonald, who became the first to drive a Canadian Leopard (CFR 72324) off a truck to its new home in the motor pool. 22-hours straight later, and well ahead of schedule, fueled largely by the mass consumption of Circle K "sock dogs", BOER Squadron was finally "home".

With working conditions that brought back memories of Ex STEELE LANCE, BOER Squadron soldiers were once again bonded through the trauma of filling tanks with jerry cans in the rain and snow while they conducted initial inspections on their new callsigns. WO Billy "conflict resolution" Montreuil and Maintenance Troop tackled F2 inspections while simultaneously irritating theatre support elements with constant requests for... well... "support". For SHQ, Squadron Ops fought a daily battle of DeJa'Vu in making requests for light stands and renegotiating range bookings. Despite what seemed like a fight for every inch of progress, to include Admin Troop helping unpack and count off of those sea cans, in just three-short-weeks the squadron had resurrected two ARVs and eight out of 15 tanks, and were ready

for zeroing. One week out from the range we even had two "confirmed" range days. As the cap stone event for our brief, but very busy deploy/TAV-ment, **Capt Ziad** "*Teslik*" **Hmaidan** and **WO Matthew** "*smokes and coffee*" **Collier** prepared for the zeroing range that only weeks ago seemed impossible.

On the chilly morning of 7 December 2023, BOER Squadron rumbled out of the AMB gates through the forest lined tracks in the Adazi Training Area (ATA) to Range C2 where a small crowd gathered with anticipation for the historic moment. The first two Leopards bombed up and took up positions on the firing line. As they had brand new barrels, it would be Maintenance Troop who would get to fire (remote) the first round. With the RCEME flag flying and after one brief dance party, spirits were high as **Cpl Aaron** "Happy Face" **Hoveland** pressed the button and sent the first Canadian 120mm round downrange. Hot off their win of our squadron's gunnery competition prior to deploying, now it was callsign 22B's turn to be the first crew to fire. Commanded by **Sgt Matthew** "Monsters for breakfast" **Pecarskie**, the crew of 22B mounted CFR 72327 to become the first Canadian crew to fire a round in Latvia. Over the next two days, BOER Squadron zeroed seven more tanks and ensured that every crew had a chance to take part in the fun.

As this first chapter of the Regiment's new persistent presence in Latvia ended, we look back at what became a deployment of many "Firsts". From the first soldiers to drive, the first to shoot, and the first to command a Canadian Tank in Latvia, to our first "sock dogs", and the first to smash a fume extractor off a power pole... (thanks **Capt Leah** "did I do that?" **Ahenakew**), the hard work and perseverance of **BOER Squadron** will surely be remembered for a long time to come.

The Story of Delays, The Boat Edition

The orders came down, Canadian tanks were going to Latvia. After months in quarantine under A Squadron (Sqn), in the summer the Leopard 2A4M's and support vehicles began being shipped to Montreal. While the tanks took a quick month-long vacation at the Herb Vankleek Truck Stop waiting for permits to enter Quebec, in August the tanks finally arrived in Montreal and the ocean preservation work began. With the help of B and Headquarters Sqn personnel that work was all wrapped up by the middle of September just as B Sqn started to conduct final pre-deployment preparations. Then... once again, delays! This time the big questions were: when do the tanks leave to go on the ship, and has the ship even been contracted?

After weeks of being on- and off-the-boat (literally), the tank escort crew departed for Montreal mid-October. There we met up with a two-person maintenance team from 1 Service Battalion (1 Svc Bn) and we were finally ready to send all the vehicles to the Port of Becancour (Trois-Riviere, QC). There we loaded the ship with 15 Leopard 2A4Ms, two Leopard 2 Armoured Recovery Vehicles and 37 total support vehicles and trailers. The first day started with great success as **MCpl Blake Wills** (1 Svc Bn) and **Cpl Gavin** "Globetrotter" **Erickson** had some navigation issues which took them sighting seeing for 40-minutes past the port, but on the way back they were able to conducted a Route Recce to Quebec City, with their total round-trip time being four-hours instead of two. Overall, the rest of the task went well, despite vehicles that didn't want to start, putting trailers on trailers, swapping hotels mid-task, and putting tanks onto trailers with only a third of the inside track pads holding on.

A little over a week later came loading day, 25 October, and in true Strathcona fashion, it rained. We started by backing in all of the wheeled vehicles and ended by the backing in all of the tanks; we had a system...

MCpl Ben Dulong (1 Svc Bn) would boost the tanks and MCpl Blake Wills and Cpl Tim "Think About IT"

Miller would drive the tanks while Cpl Gavin Erickson and MCpl Emma "I swear it is impossible for me to frown" Crackle-Skulason would guide them onto the ship. This was delicate work, with some tanks being only centimeters apart, but by 20:00 hours that night, the cargo was loaded, and we were ready to depart.

On departure day, we arrived at the contracted ship called **Oranjeborg** and the crew quickly showed us our rooms, gave a safety demonstration, and then it was lunch time. Moving out to the deck we decided it was time to say goodbye to Canada for a few months, or so we thought as we quickly realized that it takes five-days to hit the open ocean. Bets were placed on who would get seasick first, but surprisingly our intestinal *perseverance* defended us from the rocking and rolling of the waves. Time passed... slowly, but entertainment was to be had with the ship's crew touring the tanks and providing us with a tour of the ship's engine room in return (we can confirm the ships engine is bigger). After 15-days at sea we finally saw the Riga port with some members of the Sqn there to greet us. It was nice to be on land again, and don't worry, there's no chance of a transfer to the navy anytime soon.






Op CALUMET IN THE SERVICE OF PEACE



Ex STEELE BEASTS







Tank serviceability issues were ever present, but that did not stop the Sqn from constantly improvising, adapting, and overcoming by enacting everyone's favourite concept: REMAINING FLEXIBLE. Regardless of all the hiccups, B Sqn ended Ex REFLEX RAPIDE having gained valuable experience working within a combined arms context in multiple languages.









Transitioning to Ex MAPLE RESOLVE meant the focus was shifted towards a deliberate maintenance surge. Our soldiers were in a state of culture shock as they adjusted to the big city life at P-12 with Lt Nicholas "Poutine Connoisseur" Dragatakis — "DRAAAAAGGGGGAAATTTAAAKIIIS" for short — frequently reminding of us what a "real" Quebec poutine entails. After what seemed like an eternity of DELAY, the Sqn moved into COUNTER-MOVES in the Brigade's Main Defensive Area where the greater threat shifted to the sun and its unrelenting heat. WO Kevin "Drone Spotter" Crowe and Lt Jeremy "Headlights" McBride fought a glorious battle, but sadly were no match for the minefields, invisible tank ditches, and endless respawning waves of enemy. After some rather curious "Tactical Pauses" for "reasons other than the Brigade's total destruction", the Sqn ADVANCED TO CONTACT, which lead to a tank knife fight in the woods and not getting lost in the bad lands. At END-EX the smoke was now so thick no one could see a thing.

In the end, B Sqn proved we are ready and capable of thriving in all conditions from -127 to +72 degrees Celsius and we can proudly say we survived the "last" MAPLE RESOLVE.

Ex STEELE SABRE 2023 was the inaugural C Squadron Troop and Squadron minus training exercise following the titanic switch from D Sqn. Beginning the 5th of September until the 23rd of October the exercise began following the early September gun camp and consisted of both day and night, dry and live fire level 1, 2, and 3 ranges. With an additional 72-hour troop defensive exercise immediately following the level 3s having the intent to perform countermoves on a Donovian offensive and send them fleeing back across the International Boundary.

The leadership of C Sqn intended to expertly train their troops in preparation for Ex STEELE BEASTS 2024 in Texas and, most importantly, qualify them for their deployment to Latvia in June 2024.

As a direct consequence of expert planning and time management by **Captain Nicolas** "Happy-Days" **Hedegaard** and **2IC Captain Ali** "Back in my day we went 500 metres into the wood line for a hide" **Mansour** the Sqn found themselves with extra time to kill before the actual, planned, END EX. 




The deployment to CFB Wainwright, immediately following a relaxing Labour Day long weekend, began with a very sweaty bus ride due to the heater in the bus being broken and stuck on full blast despite being turned off. Little did I know of the foreshadowing this steam-room, sauna bus ride was to be of the 57-degree diesel heaters that would pump fire into our troop tents at night. However, when we arrived at Range 16, Admin Troop had wonderfully set up camp a short 2-minute walk down the hill from the MKT which overlooked the firing pad and range. Level 1 Stab Run Shoots at night was the first time that the majority of us crew commanded a tank at night, so driving in a straight-line blowing stuff up was overly exciting. Using the monocle night vision goggle to crew command was terrible – only – if you did not know how to use the luminosity intensity knob. Once you had that dialed in crew commanding at night became extremely rewarding; if anything, more exciting and challenging than during the day. Of course, the targets were barely "targets" after a few runs because everyone shot out the fires illuminating them. By the time I did my run, my gunner **Cpl Bryce** "NOT OBSERVED" **Addison** could hardly make out any targets through the gunners' sights and we barely got our rounds off before the end of the run.

Level 2 day and night shoots at Range 25 consisted of 3-tank troops moving in line, engaging targets up to the Line of Exploitation, then engaging targets in the distance. My crew was lucky and got an extra run because our left track exploded as we crossed the Line of Departure. Fixing the exploded track until 0530 in the morning was a blast. We made it to our hide by 0600 and were awake for 0700 to hand the tanks over to the next troop. Level 3 and 4 traces were exhilarating. There was so much going on. It was, in a way, organized chaos.





Strathcona Mounted Troop



Strathconas in Egypt

Greetings to our fellow Strathconas from the Sinai Peninsula in Egypt! We are proud to share that **LCol Fred Hayward** and **CWO Rob Clarke** are currently serving as part of the Multinational Force & Observers (MFO) in the region.

An independent peacekeeping operation, the MFO's roots can be traced back to the 1979 Treaty of Peace between Egypt and Israel. The treaty parties initially sought the United Nations' assistance in providing a force and observers to oversee the treaty's implementation, however, due to difficulties in obtaining Security Council approval for a UN peacekeeping force, a Protocol was negotiated in 1981. This Protocol established the MFO as an alternative to the envisioned UN force – the reason why Force members wear a terracotta/orange headdress and not the typical blue

associated with Peacekeeping. The Force is comprised of 15 troop contributing nations, and totals over 1400 soldiers and civilians from places such as Australia, New Zealand, Fiji, Colombia, and the US to name a few.

Operation CALUMET represents Canada's contribution to the Force. Task Force El Gorah, led by a Colonel who doubles as the Force Chief Liaison Officer, consists of senior leaders and experts in logistics, training, and engineering. The small (39 pers) Canadian contingent provides critical support by keeping track of positions, providing essential information on traffic, weather, and flight plans, and ensuring the smooth operation of helicopters and small fixed-wing aircraft used by the MFO. As for your Strathconas; **LCol** "which way to the golf course?" **Hayward** leads the Force Training Team (FTT) under the watchful eye of **CWO** "cat herder" **Clarke** who holds the position of Force Sergeant Major (FSM).

The current mission has not been without its challenges and the outbreak of the 2023 war between Hamas and Israel has heightened tensions in the region. The MFO, including the Canadian contingent, has faced an increased threat with incidental rocket landings near their positions and frequent radar locks impeding air travel between north and south camps. However, despite these risks, the Canadians have carried out their duty with utmost professionalism during this intense period.

While the war has brought an element of risk to the mission, it has also presented unique opportunities for the Canadian team to travel for work. From Cairo to Tel Aviv, Rome to Bogota, and even the United States, these experiences have enriched the CAF members' understanding of diverse cultures and further highlighted the professionalism and adaptability of Strathconas in any organization.







2023 has been an exceptional year for the Royal Lancers (Queen Elizabeths' Own).

The Regiment started the year with D Squadron deployed to Poland as part of NATO's Enhanced Forward Presence. This involved the conversion to JACKAL, or High Mobility Terrain Vehicle – a wheeled variant that is lightly armoured but very manoeuvrable. HQ Squadron deployed to the South Kent coastline to aid in the delivery of training to members of the Ukrainian Armed forces. This training formed part of a commitment by the UK Government to provide continued support to Ukraine. We were delighted to be joined by members of the Canadian Armed Forces and were even happier to spot a few Strathconas among their ranks.



In April C Squadron deployed to Poland to take over from D Squadron, and A Squadron deployed to Kosovo as part of the NATO contribution to safety and security in the country. On this tour, the Squadron Second-in-Command, **Captain Erik Giajnorio**, was awarded a Commendation by General Officer Commanding 3rd (United Kingdom) Division, **Major General James Martin DSO**, **OBE**, **MC**, for his excellent work.

Meanwhile B Squadron have had a hugely productive period, seizing the opportunity to demonstrate and test their capabilities on Salisbury Plain for Exercise SCORPION CYCLONE / IRON TITAN. Acting as one of the lead reconnaissance assets for 1st Deep Recce Strike Brigade Combat Team, the Squadron successfully deployed and operated on the WARRIOR armoured vehicle, fighting with innovation based on the lessons learned from the ongoing war in Ukraine. One area that was introduced successfully was the use of organic RPAS (Remote Piloted Air Systems) on individual WARRIORS. The advantage of using drones from armoured vehicles on a fast-moving and digitally focused battlefield allowed B Squadron to extend the reach of their target acquisition and reconnaissance, as well as feeding valuable data back towards the Battlegroup and to Brigade.

It has been an equally busy time for Home Headquarters as on 8th June, **Her Majesty Queen Camilla** was appointed our new Colonel-in-Chief. The appointment is splendid news since The Queen is a true 'daughter of the Regiment': Her Majesty's late father, **Major Bruce Shand MC and Bar, DL**, won the Military Cross twice whilst serving with the 12th Lancers during the Second World War. There was also a large contingent of Royal Lancers who were on parade during the coronation of **His Majesty King Charles**.

It has of course been a great pleasure for us to have **Captain Erik Giajnorio** provide his usual Canadian charm and warmth to the Officers' Mess. It was sad to see him leave but we were delighted to welcome his successor **Captain Emma Perry** in July. She has fitted in seamlessly and has picked up where Erik left off.

10th Armoured Cavalry Brigade

One of the main tasks carried out in 10th ACB was the training and preparation of the Brigade's soldiers for international tasks. Accordingly, major part of the training was focused on cooperation with allied forces. In addition, the Polish Armed Forces were put to a great test. In support of the defense of the border area in the eastern part of the country, fraction of the unit's forces were assigned to the Military Task Group "Podlasie". As a part of this MTG, the soldiers took part in tactical exercise ZUBR-23. In order to synchronize subunits, which trained in the unrestricted area, often moving on public roads to previously recognized areas, where they performed various tasks.

Operational tasks, however did not stop the Brigade from performing ordinary training such as the one conducted at the Engineering Forces Day.

Explosives training is just a small part of the skills that Engineering Forces are able to perform. Training provides preparation for operations in combat situations, where every second and decision made can be crucial. Each of these activities requires focus, self-control and precision, as all of these traits contribute to the safety of

the duty not only of those involved in the training, but also for the entire environment.

Gen. Stanislaw Maczek, when liberating Breda in the Netherlands, among other places, ordered the soldiers to fight hard, but in a chivalrous manner, and they succeeded in this remarkable thing - they combined bravery and training with the general's great wisdom and concern for the fate of the city and its inhabitants. In the autumn of 1944. Traditionally, every year on the last weekend of October, the residents of Breda and numerous guests from around the world, including a delegation from the 10 ACB come together to celebrate the next anniversary of the liberation of the city by soldiers of the 1st Polish Armored Division (1PAD), who fought alongside Canadian forces, namely



4th Canadian Armoured Division. On October 29, 1944, the 1st Polish Armored Division, under the command



of **General Stanislaw Maczek**, whose unit was assigned to the II Canadian Corps, liberated Breda. Both the city and its inhabitants did not suffer heavy losses, but during the liberation many Polish soldiers lost their lives, their footsteps are followed by the soldiers of the Black Division who, every year in the cemeteries at the soldiers' graves, as a sign of respect for their predecessors, bow the military banners.

The training carried out by the soldiers was intended to familiarize them with the realities of the mission and prepare them for the tasks they will face in Lebanon.

Under the guidance of a certification team, maneuvers were held to summarize the entire training and evaluate the various criteria necessary to function as part of the 8th change of the UN Contingent.

The core of the shift is the "Dragoons of Świętoszów" - the mechanized battalion of the 10th Armored Cavalry Brigade. The main purpose of the certification was to confirm the preparation for participation, along with testing the synchronization of the subunit.

Along with a comprehensive check of soldiers' knowledge of procedures during situations such as IED detection, mortar shelling or evacuation under MEDAVAC pickup, the soldiers also had to demonstrate comprehensive marksmanship training and first aid skills on the battlefield.

During the training of Ukrainian Forces in 10th ACB in Leopard Training Center in Świętoszów, supported by the instructors from Canada, a visitation of Commander of Canadian Joint Operations Command - Vice Admiral J. Robert Auchterlonie took place.




The aim of this visit was to inspect the training capabilities of the Leopard Training Center, in order to ensure best quality of training for our mutual allies. Moreover it was an opportunity to exchange experiences and training methods of tank crews.



Training of soldiers also means international cooperation. As part of this, some of the soldiers of the 10th Armored Cavalry Brigade had the opportunity to participate in a training course, which was organized by soldiers of the U.S. Army stationed in Świętoszów on a daily basis. Two intensive days of learning brought Polish drivers new experience, introducing innovative techniques and using American equipment. An extremely important aspect of the training was the exchange of experience between Polish and American soldier-drivers. Both sides shared their unique perspectives, which allowed them to understand the differences in their approaches to driving and the technologies they use.

On September 8, a transfer of command ceremony was held at the 10th Armored Cavalry Brigade. **Brig. Gen. Grzegorz Barabieda** finished his command of the Brigade, and **Colonel (now Brigadier General) Miroslaw Downar** was appointed to the position of Commander. The new Commander also received the symbol of the 11th Armored Cavalry Division - a black epaulet, which every soldier in our Division wears. It symbolizes the "Black Devils" - soldiers of **Gen. Stanislaw Maczek**, who fought in black berets and black leather jackets during World War II, and whose extraordinary courage and determination was standing out among other soldiers.
