Message from the Colonel of the Regiment

If the end of 2021 saw the Regiment break out from our pandemic restraints, the year 2022 witnessed a return to full normal. The agenda has been packed and the demands more than steady, yet it has been heartening to observe that the past year has seen the reintroduction of several features of regimental life that have been absent for some considerable time. Of course, training exercises and international deployments (Op IMPACT in particular) shaped our dance card, but it was uplifting to see events like adventure training, Jr NCO PD sessions, and even block leave take their long absent, but richly rewarding, place on the master schedule. And as these things go, it could not have happened at a better time given that 2022 was also a year of great international tension and change.

While it is rare that world events make their presence felt on the tank park, (exceptions are always possible and with the sudden outbreak of inter-state war in Eastern Europe) we all felt the gears shift up a notch. The attendant consequences, fully anticipated, made their effects known with adjustments to our regimental posture whereby readiness standards have been confirmed and a concerted push made to ensure our equipment is 'running and gunning'.

Equally, all Strathcona's were saddened by the sudden passing of **Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II**, under whose reign the vast majority of our Regimental Family have served their entire careers. The Regiment was touched directly by this moment, when during the internationally renowned Spruce Meadows Master's Tournament, our Mounted Troop seamlessly assumed responsibility for the Tournament programme gap created by the immediate recall to London, UK of the Household Cavalry detachment. I know of few other regiments that could have fulfilled this special duty so quickly and professionally in an emotionally charged public occasion with so much at stake. In its way, it was a fitting Strathcona's tribute to Her Late Majesty and indeed, to our Colonel in Chief, **His Majesty King Charles III**.

As has often happened our long history, certain major events can project the Regiment's core purpose in sharp relief. And when this purpose is matched with the spirit, courage, and determination that feature in the pages of this Strathconian edition, we all may rest assured that the Strathcona's are up to the task, whatever and whenever that may be.

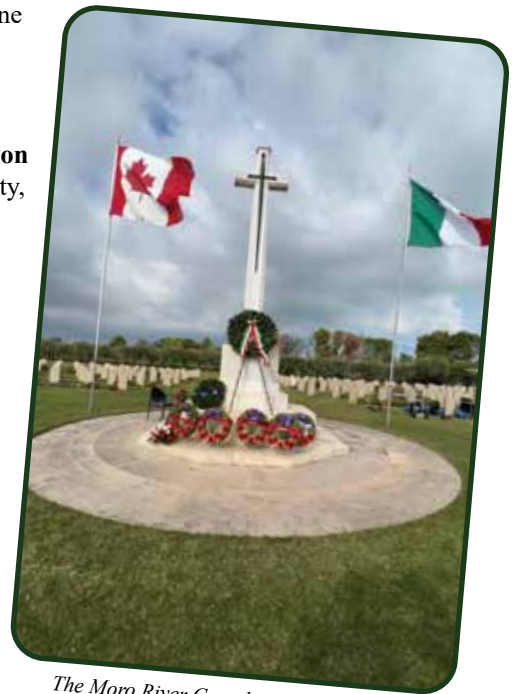
Uncertain times means Canada needs the Army at its best.

Commanding Officer's Message

Looking back on the year that was 2022, it's hard to express how proud and impressed I am with the resilience shown by the soldiers of our Regiment. It was a year where the only constant was change. With the ever-changing commitments to deployed operations and the instability created by the war in Ukraine, there was never a dull moment or a plan that survived first contact! When we embarked on 2022, little did we know that hundreds of our soldiers would be deployed on Operations IMPACT, REASSURANCE, CALUMET, UNIFIER, and SOPRANO; deployments spanning eight countries on three continents.

We kicked off 2022 forming the lead mounting unit for Op IMPACT bringing soldiers from across the 3rd Division (and a handful of sailors and aviators from across the CAF) through our doors to complete their pre-deployment training. We were on the bus... then off the bus... for potential deployments across Europe as Canada and our Allies continued to adapt to the situation in the Ukraine. On short notice, a troop of motivated soldiers eventually did deploy as part of Op UNIFIER onto a British Army led mission to deliver basic training to Ukrainian soldiers. Make no mistake, the training that our soldiers provided to these new recruits has saved lives and helped them win battles to protect their homeland. Our commitment to NATO partners on Op REASSURANCE continued unabated with cavalry troops and a handful of staff officers and NCOs deploying with successive PPCLI battle groups. With the numbers committed to operations, there were days in garrison where the hallways were all but empty, but the home team took advantage of every opportunity and stayed focused on the future. Training focused on developing individual skills through formal courses or troop-level training. Tank barns and maintenance bays were

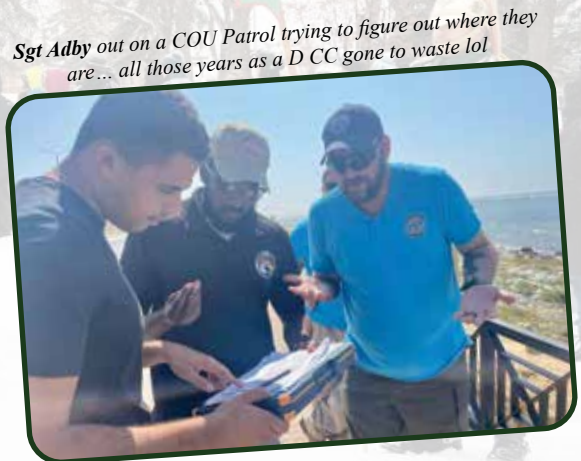

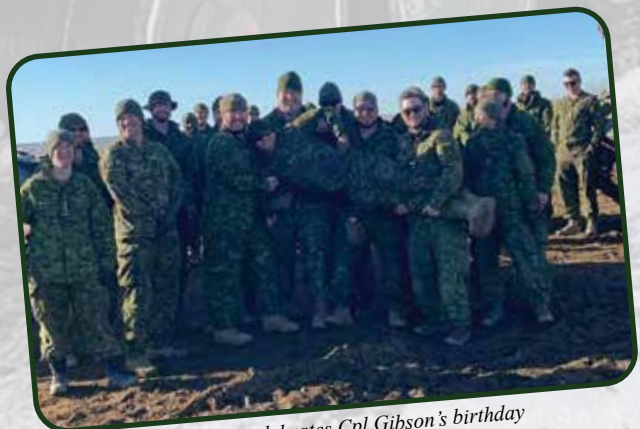

2022 was a busy year for all Strathconas. While many deployed on numerous operations around the world, those Strathconas remaining in Edmonton were busy planning and executing all necessary annual training and PCF cycles. Standing up a Base Auxiliary Security Force (BASF), embarking on adventure training in the Canadian Rockies, and successfully completing a week-long virtual exercise focused on Troop- and Crew-level skills were just a few examples where the Regiment combined training with fun. A busy year indeed, but in typical Strathcona style all persevered.

The first event of note occurred in the spring of 2022, when the Strathconas provided two Platoon-sized sub-units to work alongside base MPs as a part of the BASF. Starting in early May, Strathconas selected from multiple Squadrons came together for focused training, including Vehicle Checkpoints (VCPs) and personnel/vehicle searches, with demo staff provided by 1 CER and 1 MP regiments.

BASF training concluded with Ex STEELE BARRIER, which took place from 23-30 May 2022. For this exercise, the first BASF Platoon took control of 3 CDSB Edmonton's North gate, establishing security and search zones, conducting ID checks, and searching vehicles as well as personnel. Soldiers of D Sqn, operated as OPFOR, led by **Sgt Kyle Nieuwhof**, who planned the scenarios, and **MCpl Matt "Metyu Belivov" Belliveau**, who acted as the main person of interest. Using ATVs and POMVs to blend in with normal base traffic, D Sqn's personnel spent two days testing BASF's checkpoint. The OPFOR started small by trying to sneak through the checkpoint, before escalating their tactics by launching small, disorganized protests and small arms attacks and finally culminating with a large-scale organized protest, led by *Metyu Belivov* himself. Shortly after the exercise, the Strathconas said farewell to **MCpl Belliveau**, who left to begin a new journey as an Intelligence Officer. Suspicious? We will let you decide.

Next, D Sqn conducted the first adventure training exercise in years. Aptly named Ex STEELE ADVENTURE, soldiers travelled to the Rocky Mountain Cadet camp from 6 to 8 June. Located southeast of Banff, the accommodations proved a pleasant surprise, as they were significantly nicer

than what armoured soldiers are normally accustomed to. The conditions were not without their hardships, however, as the troops were forced to make their way to the tops of the many surrounding high features if they wanted cellular service. The adventure training itself consisted of various daytime outdoors activities, such as mountain biking, hiking, canoeing, and driving ATVs. Soldiers were given the freedom to pick which activities they wanted to participate in each day, and were treated to beer and D Sqn signature “Dirty Dogs” each evening.

Ex STEELE ADVENTURE provided D Sqn an opportunity to unwind after a winter of hard work and PCF Cycles. The weather cooperated for the first day of hiking, mountain biking and canoeing, but an abundance of rain and mud welcomed the troops to the second day, adding a new challenge for those on ATVs, two feet or two wheels. Even adventure training could not escape the old adage, “it isn’t training if it isn’t raining.”

The final major Ex of the year, Ex STEELE VIRTUAL, kicked off in mid-October. Due to heavily reduced manning, the exercise was limited in scope to just one week of joint VBS training led by B Sqn, with A and D Sqns attached. D Sqn was split into two troops, 42 and 43, with the former leading the way in TAPVs while the latter sat pretty in LAV 6s. Through

17 to 21 October, the VBS was utilised to execute simulated advances and delays at the Crew, Troop and Squadron levels, with an emphasis on the Crew and Troop levels.

Prior to the exercise, D Sqn Troopers and Corporals had created a large-scale map model and crew commanders conducted “rock drills” by creating and executing scenarios with small blocks in order to familiarize their crews with orders, vehicle and troop movements, and drills. Thanks to this preparation, D Sqn would be able to overcome some significant hurdles during the exercise. Some crews were led by unqualified crew commanders thanks to reduced manning. Additionally, most crews suffered non-stop communications issues, several got stuck on pixelated branches and shrubbery, and all were forced to contend with enemy vehicles that took up to three combat loads-worth of ammunition to destroy. Nevertheless, D Sqn defied the odds and excelled throughout the week.

The highlight of the exercise was the shining bravery of one Trooper, who managed to survive a virtual onslaught that eliminated every other soldier in 43 before dismounting their vehicle, calling an artillery strike on enemy positions and advancing towards an enemy Troop on foot while struggling through simulated injuries. Unfortunately, this fearless soldier failed to escape the fate of their colleagues when they dropped a frag grenade at their own feet while attempting to disable an enemy T72 main battle tank, thus ending the noble computer-generated story. After a riveting discussion of lessons learned throughout the week, the completion of this VBS training was marked by a clean-up of monitors, cables and tables at the LTF Drill Hall.

Overall, 2022 kept the Regiment on its toes and allowed the Squadrons to prove, even to themselves, that they could step up and get the work done, having a good time through the suck all while undermanned.

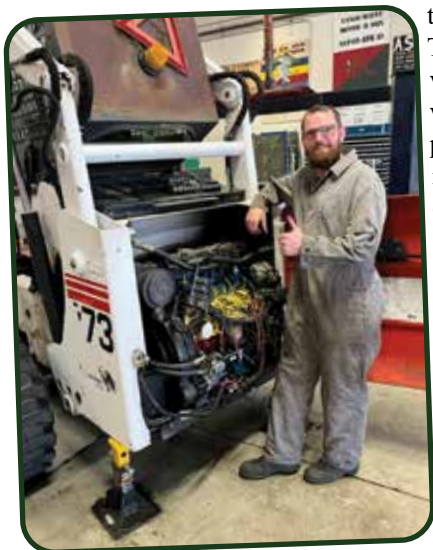

In what was supposed to be a year of “reconstitution”, 2022 didn’t provide us with a Brigade level exercise, yet it managed to deliver a heavy workload to Headquarters Squadron – Maintenance Troop. Guided by **Capt Frank “Pretty boy” Gelin**as and **MWO Shawn “Too big for his britches” Hughes**, the Command Team steered the Regiment’s largest Troop (69 pers strong) through new challenges and obstacles. The sections worked tirelessly preparing Leopards, LAV 6s, TAPVs and a multitude of A & B Fleet platforms for upcoming taskings, IRU preparedness, and possible deployment.

With the possibility of deploying tanks, the Leo maintenance sections at the FME Building kicked into overdrive. The A4Ms were brought up to operational status as quickly as possible for an ever moving deadline. Chassis started the year off with all Armoured Recovery Vehicles (ARVs) grounded for F4 or F5 inspections. This task was originally to be completed with Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM) support but ended up being added to the normal workload of the technicians. The preventative maintenance required during these high level F inspections included removing the ARV boom and overhauling the hydraulic systems. **Sgt Paul Cross** and his “Henchman” **MCpl P.O. Borne** oversaw

the fine details and technical repairs being done for the first time. Turret took on a new role, performing upgrades and modifications; work that would normally be completed by second or third line workshops. Retrofitting the A4Ms with new barrels and ancillary parts, in order to prepare for the CAF’s plans. The entire process required a teardown of the turret internals and demanded constant communication and coordination. **Sgt Marc “The proctologist” Lussier**, various LCMs, and several levels of Supply had constant back and forth to properly install and record the upgrades. Achieving the Army’s end state was no small feat and called for teamwork and cohesion between EO, Weapons Techs and the supporting Armoured Crews.

With the needs of the Regiment to train and have members qualified, the push for TAPVs and LAV 6s were the main effort of the A Fleet shop. During the constant flux of the contract for parts, the technicians were able to band-aid the necessary vehicles together and support the PCF cycle. The deployment of TAPVs

and LAV 6s for Ex STEEL CARBINE came with some ups and downs. The need to repair a LAV 6 brake system while on the firing line was completed with precision by **Cpl Jordan “The blue-haired tech” Riley**. With the slowing of parts for the TAPV Fleet, **Sgt Barry “Don’t ask just go with it” Gaudet** was able to do his magic and have the required vehicles for the exercise.

B Fleet – the unsung hero, is always a need for the Regiment. Whether it be for driver courses, ranges, exercises, IRU or whatever pops up. Squadrons were able to complete their mandated courses and exercises because of the dedicated work from the B vehicle shop. With the need for members to be qualified platforms, **Sgt Rob “Hands in everything” Broadfoot** put together and instructed on multiple MACK courses with his extensive knowledge and being a stickler for details these courses have prepared members of the Regiment for any situation that may arise.

The most trade diverse section in Maint Troop; Non-Leo Ancillary focused on getting equipment ready for this year’s gun camps and gunnery courses. The EO/Weapons team successfully maintained the TAPVs, LAV 6s, small arms and supported two Regimental gun camps. SPSS worked diligently to issue and receive all parts IOT support the Leopard push. Miraculously, they were able to source parts from across the country, and ensured timely acquisition, cutting down the average wait time from months into days (or even hours in many cases). The Mat Techs were stuck in the welding bay with a revolving door of Leopards requiring hulls to be repaired. LCIS showed true dedication. With a sudden change of plans requiring vehicles to depart on lowbeds first thing in the morning, the technicians arrived at zero dark stupid and went down the line of departing vehicles ensuring communications serviceability.

After such a hectic 2021, the Regiment recognized the hard work of the various Troops and was able to give back. Adventure training was organized for the Squadrons and groups of smiling faces departed 3 CDSB Edmonton by coach heading southwest into the foothills. Staging out of Rocky Mountain Cadet Camp, soldiers were able to enjoy the scenery by partaking in mountain biking, canoeing, hiking and riding ATVs. Operation REASSURANCE

This year, it was with great pleasure that the Strathconas had the opportunity to deploy on Op REASSURANCE 22-02 NATO Enhanced Forward Presence (eFP) Battle Group (BG) in Latvia from May to December 2022. The lead mounting unit for the BG was 2nd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (2 PPCLI) under the command of **LCol Jesse van Eijk**. Strathconas contributed by sending an Armoured Recce Pl as part of Combat Support (CS) Company and the S1, led by **Capt Mike "Gross Michelle" Uusoue**, within BG HQ. The Armoured Recce Pl was under the tutelage of **Capt Scott "Still perma balaclava" Veale** and **WO Wallace "C/S Unicorn" Churchill** that had the pleasure of commanding Strathcona soldiers, including a Reserve crew from the Saskatchewan Dragoons.

CS Company alone consisted of Canadian, Italian, Slovenian, Albanian, Spanish, Montenegrin, and North Macedonian soldiers, each providing a unique asset and skill set to the BG. The first opportunity for Strathconas to shine was during the BG ready week, where the Canadian Recce Pl was tasked with zeroing nearly 700 Canadian soldiers C7/8 Rifles over a three-day period. **MCpls Cole "Fozzy bear" Foster** and **Christopher "Grover" Snelgrove** made lasting impressions with their ability to coach and mentor soldiers during the zeroing process, ensuring that all soldiers were ready. Building relationships with other nations was certainly a priority and was taken to heart by **Tpr Seth "Bolt cutters" Wesloski** taking every opportunity to mingle with other nations soldiers and trade patches.

Progressing quickly through the RAMPART series of integrating exercises, Strathcona soldiers developed the capabilities alongside a dismounted Recon section from 2 PPCLI led by **Sgt Kevin Walker** that helped develop the Pl's ability to be just as effective dismounted as mounted. Becoming the Swiss Army knife of CS Company, the Pl effectively employed mounted, dismounted, and MUAS capabilities during the BG confirmatory Integrated Capstone Exercise (ICE), Ex SILVER ARROW 22-02. During Ex SILVER ARROW, MUAS capabilities played a pivotal role in providing early warning and affecting

indirect fires. **MCpl Cole Foster** was incredibly dominant within their role as a MUAS Det Comd, providing information at the Bde level. Having successfully completed ICE, we moved on to an urban operations exercise dubbed Ex STEELE BREACH. The Strathconas and elements of 2 PPCLI Recon Section, with Snipers, ventured out of Latvia and into Estonia to learn new skills, build cohesion, and to have fun.

Operation UNIFIER

Op UNIFIER was launched in response to requests from the Government of Ukraine with the intention to help keep Ukraine free, sovereign, secure, and stable. Canada has deployed CAF soldiers to the United Kingdom to train Ukrainian civilians into soldiers as part of Op UNIFIER.

Shoot ... Move ... Communicate ... Medicate ...

These are the four principles guiding the training delivery program for Ukrainian recruits in the United Kingdom. Since August, the Strathconas, 3rd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, 1 Combat Engineer Regiment, and 1 Field Ambulance, along with other supporting elements from across the CAF, have been working alongside the British Army to teach recruits from the Security Forces of Ukraine (SFU) basic soldiering skills. It has been quite the challenge, which is something Strathconas never shy away from, but an equally rewarding opportunity to take part in the transformation of ordinary citizens into combat ready soldiers.

Members from the Strathconas have been directly involved in the planning, coordination, and delivery of training under Op UNIFIER-UK. Although not employed in a traditional armoured capacity, soldiers from the Regiment have distinguished themselves as professional and reliable instructors in the training teams along with providing assistance in the headquarters. The integration among black hatters and ground pounders was a seamless one.

Jokes aside, this opportunity has provided members of the Regiment a chance to get out of their vehicles, *really* test their rain jackets, and get muddy in the trenches, while solidifying traditional dismounted skills along with teaching in an extremely challenging environment. Greetings from the Republic of South Sudan. Full disclosure, I have no proof the above phone call ever actually occurred, but I guarantee there are hints of truth in it. All jokes aside, I would like to share with the Regimental Family this pretty unique experience that the Regiment has given me. For us Captain-types, a yearlong Canadian Joint Operations Command tour is difficult to get and it is even more challenging to get one with the United Nations. It is basically the unicorn of deployments. We hear about them now and then but few of us have ever actually ever met someone that has been on one.

What is Op SOPRANO? That is a good question because I immediately thought it was in Italy and sipping sangria in Rome briefly flashed in front of my eyes. That was embarrassingly and woefully incorrect. This mission is the Individual Uniformed Personnel commitment of the Canadian Armed Forces to UNMISS. The pillars of the mission are: 1) Protection of Civilians; 2) Creating conditions conducive to the delivery of humanitarian assistance; 3) Supporting the implementation of the revitalized agreement and the peace process; and 4) Monitoring and investigating human

right violations. To achieve this mission there are approximately 18,000 deployed personnel, of which around 14,000 are military. The military component of this mission is divided into a Force HQ (Division level) and six forward deployed Sector HQs (Brigade level).

The CAF team here consists of eight military personnel from across Canada and from several elements. In Bentiu, I serve as G4 Sector Unity. In this sector we have a Mongolian Infantry Battalion, Ghanian Infantry Battalion, Pakistani Engineering Company, Ghanian Force Protection Unit,

Vietnamese Level II Hospital, Indian Force Signals Unit, and a Cambodian Military Police Detachment. The greatest challenge we face here is that all lines of communication to this part of the country have been severed due to extreme flooding. This flooding has caused significant pain and suffering to those who call this region home. How bad is the flooding you might ask? It's bad. In fact, our base and airstrip are protected by a series of dikes holding back around 160cm of flood water. We are also collocated with an Internally Displaced People (IDP) camp which has well over 100,000 IDP. Everyday several humanitarian organizations work tirelessly to provide the basic needs of those displaced. I can honestly say that these are some of the kindest and most selfless people I have ever met.

The conditions of life as an officer on UN service here are challenging but it is a truly humbling experience. To see the international communities' and government of South Sudan's efforts with the provision of food, medical services, and security at this scale is something to behold. I continue to be enriched by the South Sudanese I interact with, the military staff officers I work with, and the civilian staff I collaborate with.

Finally, a sales pitch. I encourage all you Captain-types to flood the Second-in-Command's inbox with requests for this mission. Besides the unique nature of being on a UN mission, where else can you wear an outside the wire shirt (no need to do any buttons up), yellow rubber boots, a tan Patagonia rain jacket, and sidearm? As a disclaimer, I will never confirm nor deny any of that last sentence. I look forward to seeing you all again in the hallways of our Regiment or more preferably in the Mess with a leaky bottle of Balvenie 14 Caribbean Cask. Take care my friends.

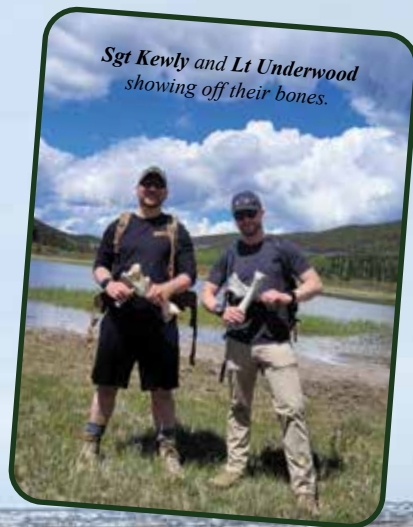

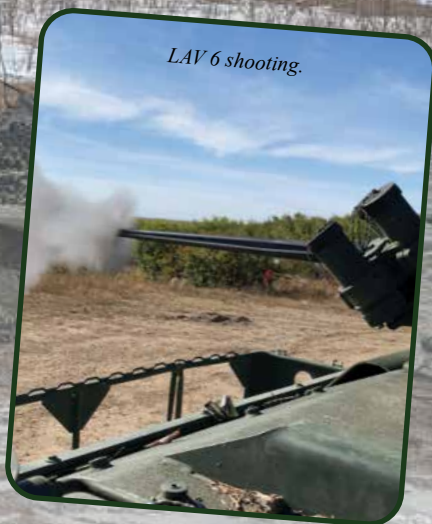

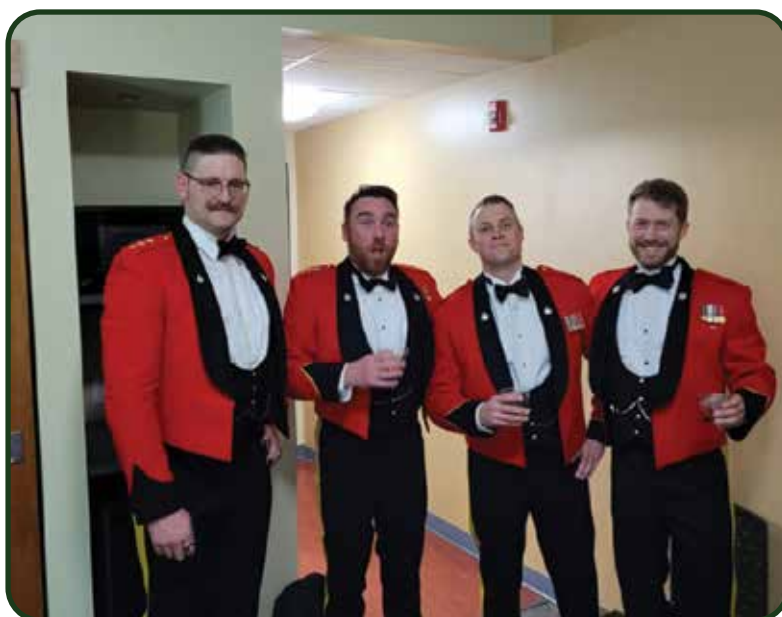

On March 30, 1918, **Lt Gordon Muriel Flowerdew** led his famous charge in the Battle of Moreuil Wood, being posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross for his leadership and bravery. Of the members of C Sqn who took part in the charge, only 51 remained with a casualty rate close to seventy percent. The Battle of Moreuil Wood is considered by military historians as one of the key events of the First World War. On this day, Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians) with the Canadian Cavalry Brigade stopped

a German offensive and forced their withdrawal from Moreuil Wood.

This year's commemoration of the Battle of Moreuil Wood was very different from the past two years due to the reduction of the COVID-19 force health protection measures. With no parade in 2020 and smaller Squadron level ceremonies in 2021, this was the first time in two years that a full Regimental parade was held. Despite no related events taking place, such as the annual Moreuil Wood Command Team Challenge or traditional mess dinners, it was satisfying to have the Regiment together as a whole on parade once again, honouring such an important event in our history. Led by our Commanding Officer **LCol Mike Mallette** and Regimental Sergeant Major **CWO Kevin King**, it was exceptional to come together as Strathconas to properly honour and celebrate the sacrifices made on this most sacred day once again.

On 6 Nov 2022, 11 Strathconas drove out to Calgary to participate in Canadian Pacific Railway's sixth annual Spin for a Veteran 24-hour stationary bike marathon. This event raised funds towards the Homes for Heroes Foundation, a charity that combats veteran homelessness through the construction of small housing complexes to integrate homeless veterans into the community. The event was held virtually last year due to COVID and the Regiment did not assemble a team. 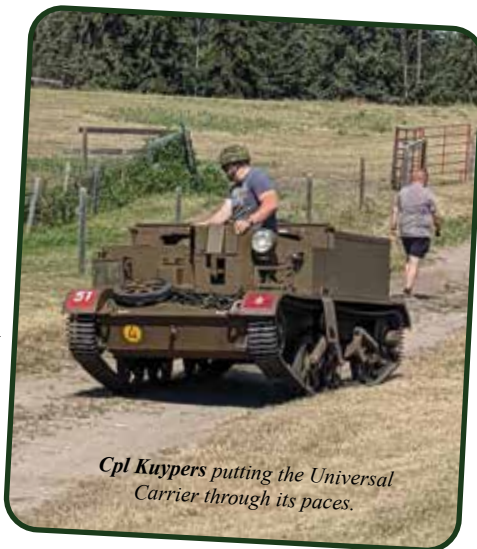
Work is continuing

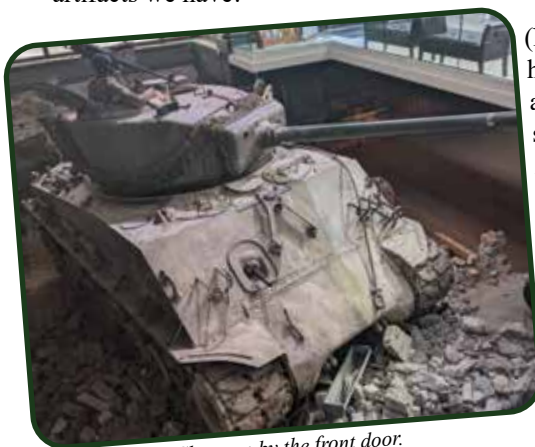

It has been a busy year since arriving in the UK to start a two-year exchange with A Sqn of The Royal Lancers (Queen Elizabeths' Own) (RL). Upon arriving in September, it was a quick turn around to get out to Seenelagar, Germany, for Ex SOMME LANCER. The multi-national Ex consisted of a physical exercise across civilian land, with A Sqn participating in a virtual Ex on the Combined Arms Trainer. The two pieces of the Ex were overlayed to one common operating picture, and A Sqn conducted physical night close target reces and raids to support the Battle Group.

The completion of Ex SOMME LANCER saw the A Sqn RL team rapidly depart again, this time off to Belize to participate in Ex MAYAN STORM. This Ex saw A Sqn spend a month living and operating in the jungle. While the Ex provided a great training experience, it assisted the Belizean Defence Force by providing a presence to deter illegal poaching and drug smuggling in the area. The Ex finished with a live fire package up to Company level, with trainers from the SAS providing lessons on jungle close quarters combat.

As Russia invaded Ukraine, A Sqn RL quickly shifted priorities. To support the UK's commitment, A Sqn sent a training and G4 team to the south of England to train the Ukrainian Armed Forces (UAF) on the CVR(T) platform. Following this, we deployed teams across Eastern Europe to assist with the movement of western military goods into the theatre. While this occurring, we trained a fleet of Land Rover drivers to prepare for Ex LUCKNOW LANCER in southwestern Scotland. A Sqn served as the RL BG's OPFOR, and operated as freethinkers to fully test the capabilities of the multi-national RL BG. It has been a great experience and pleasure serving with the RL thus far and re-strengthening our historical ties.

Having received an excellent baseline training from our home Regiment, the Strathconas in 3rd Canadian Division Support Group (3 CDSG) are ideally suited in providing the institutional support to over 13,000 3rd Canadian Division soldiers required to train for overseas missions and to support Divisional soldiers during domestic operations. 3 CDSG is headquartered at 3rd Canadian Division Support Base, Edmonton (3 CDSB Edmonton). The formation consists of 3 CDSB Edmonton, 3 CDSB Edmonton – Detachment Wainwright, CFB Shilo, and CFB Suffield. As a formation, 3 CDSG takes care of the baseline institutional support from Thunder Bay to British Columbia – to include much of the Arctic. This includes support to; infrastructure, ranges, training areas, personnel services, and technical services. Personnel services include support such as the garrison orderly room, releases, language training, kitchens, gyms, base traffic and career transitioning. Technical services include support such as clothing stores, base maintenance, as well as snow and ice removal.

3 CDSG is an integrated team of Regular, Reserve, and civilian members focused on the provision of integral support across the largest, and arguably most challenging, AOR within the Canadian Army. 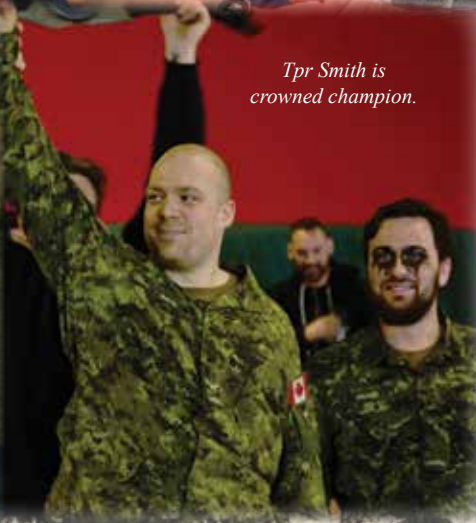

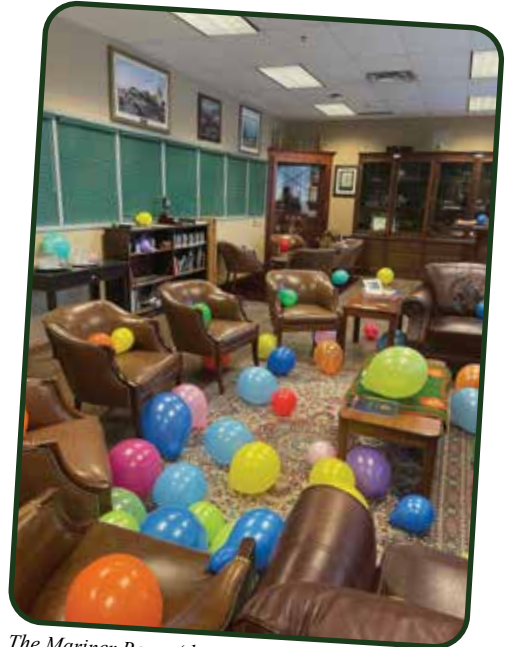

All-in-all a great year of memories for the mess, certainly for this member who looks forward to four more years, four more years, four more years!

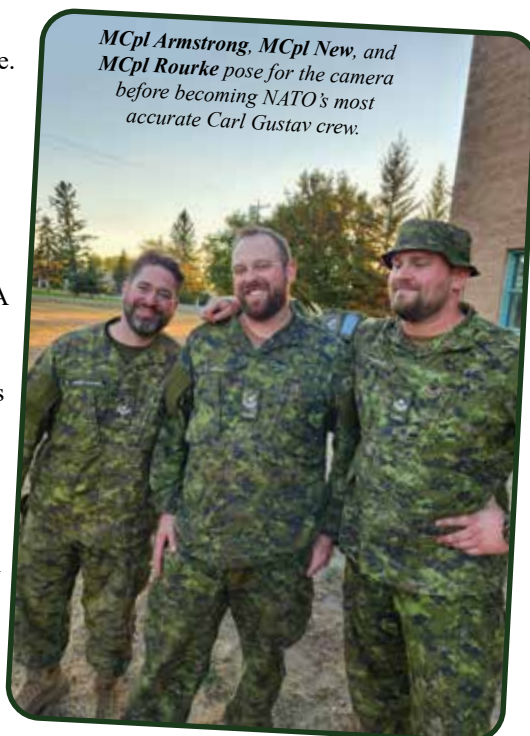
The Green Point Lounge

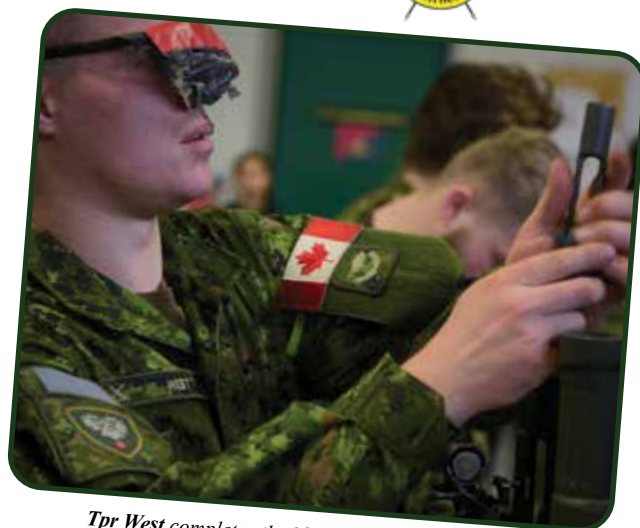

The Trooper Funk belt on display.



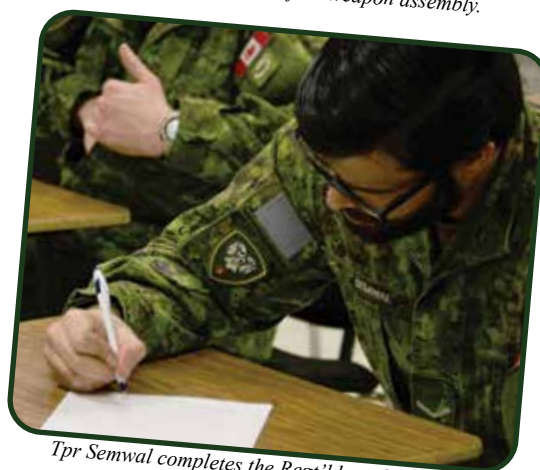

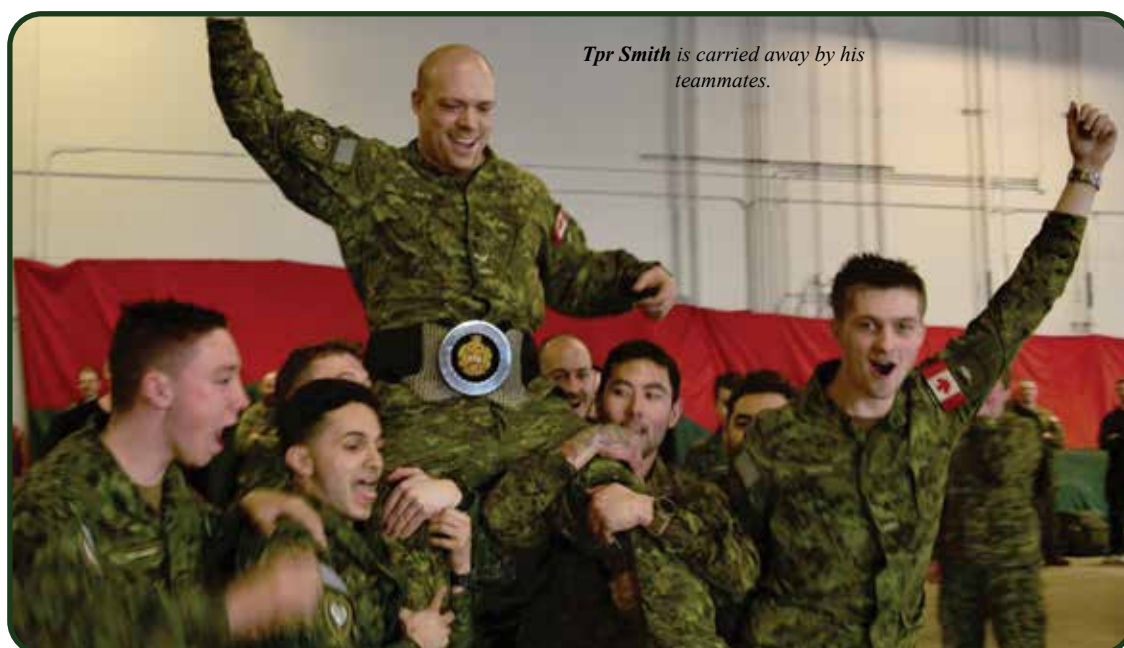

2022 has been an extraordinary year for the Royal Lancers (Queen Elizabeths' Own). The Regiment began the year with B Squadron deployed to Kosovo as part of the NATO contribution to safety and security in the country. D Squadron were preparing for their deployment to Poland in October as part of the Enhanced Forward Presence, and C Squadron were beginning their preparations to take over from them in 2023. This involved the conversion to JACKAL, or High Mobility Terrain Vehicle – a wheeled variant that is lightly armoured but very manoeuvrable.

The Regiment soon discovered that it would be involved in two further operations. In the spring, it became clear that we would provide another Squadron to deploy to Kosovo in April 2023 (A Squadron), and in the autumn we discovered that we would be contributing to training Ukrainian conscripts as part of

the West's contribution to the war in Ukraine. The Royal Lancers have therefore ended 2022 with one Squadron deployed to Poland, one Squadron soon to deploy to Kent to train the Armed Forces of Ukraine, one Squadron to deploy to Poland, and one Squadron to deploy to Kosovo. Our final Squadron would be furiously converting to WARRIOR, a tracked, well-armoured infantry fighting vehicle.

However, 2022 hasn't been solely operationally focussed. In the summer, the Regiment deployed to the Galloway Forest in south-west Scotland on Ex LUCKNOW LANCER, a Battlegroup-level exercise that included Sub-Units from our Danish allied regiment – the Danish Guard Hussars – and the Household Cavalry. In the absence of a collective training event provided by the Army, we built our own exercise on which we were able to train as a Battlegroup against a Squadron-sized dynamic enemy force. It was a fantastic experience for everyone involved, particularly for our junior soldiers who had never deployed on an exercise of that scale.

It was with immense sadness that our Colonel-in-Chief **Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II** died in September, but the Regiment was privileged to be involved in the funeral procession. The Regiment had a special relationship with Her Majesty, and she had served as the Regiment's Colonel-in-Chief for 75 years. Last year was quite an intensive period in 10th Brigade. From the very beginning soldiers have been backing the Border Guard. During this time, they protected the Polish borders during the migration crisis. This heavy service has had a profound influence on the Brigade's priorities during 2022.

In March 2022 there was a special driving course held in difficult conditions. Soldiers not only learned about reacting to unexpected situations on a road, but also trained their mechanical competences and the application of first aid.

In April 2022 the Brigade was mainly focused on training enlistees. They were taught by highly professional instructors. The schedule of the training contained subjects such as shooting, discipline and military behaviour rules, as well as physical exercises and drill. After their basic course, candidates swore

their oaths and started their professional duties in different units in Poland.

The most essential exercise during the last year was DEFENDER EUROPE 22 which took place in the Drawsko Pomorskie Training Ground. This exercise was an excellent occasion for international collaboration between soldiers from allied countries' armies. The cyclical exercise once again tested the Polish Armed Forces' ability for allied interactions with other troops of NATO countries in diverse conditions. Participants in the exercise were German, American, and Danish soldiers. This exercise was about one month, and it encompassed 2000 attendees and 700 pieces of diversified equipment in total.

In 2022 there was a change of command of 10th Brigade which has been taken by **Colonel Grzegorz Barabieda**, who has got a promotion to general's rank from the President of the Republic of Poland, **Andrzej Duda** in August 2022.

Also in August, a brigade annual celebration took place. The date of the Brigade's Day was set to commemorate the fighting of 1st Armored Cavalry Division in Normandy. Moreover, the date of the 10th Armored Cavalry Brigade formation on August 8th 1944 falls on the anniversary of the 1st Division's participation in the Battle of Falaise, which was in 1944.

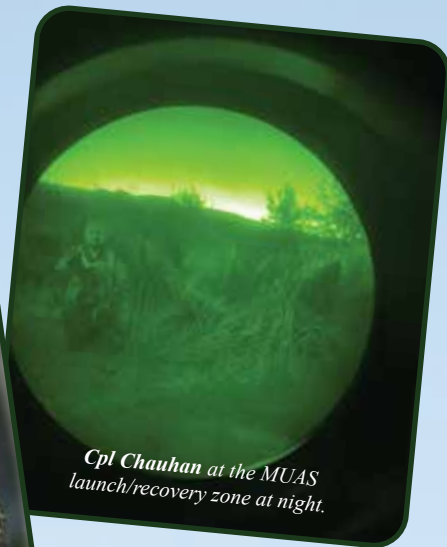
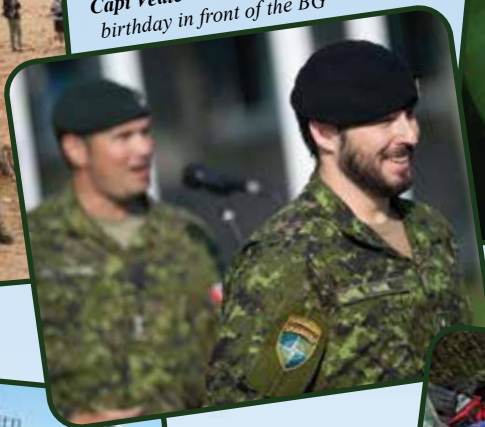
